
Heatstroke

Right at the top of the list, for all of our furry friends, is heatstroke. Our top tips? Never leave an animal in a hot car, conservatory or caravan. Don't walk your dog in the hotter parts of the day - only walk in the early morning or later in the evening when it's cooled down. And always give them shaded areas for a snooze and constant access to fresh, cool water.

Sunburn

Yes, our pets can get sunburnt too! Especially animals with white fur or thinner patches of hair. Cats can easily get sunburnt on the tips of their ears. So, protect your pet pals with pet-safe sunscreen - it's just as important to apply it to them before going out in the sun as it is for us!

Insect bites and stings
