Let's hit you with some fun facts...

- Moles can dig up to 18 feet in one hour
- They have a great sense of smell, but they don't see very well
- There's no time for hibernation! Instead, moles work all year round to dig and catch food
- Moles are mostly solitary creatures and so live in their own tunnelling network
- Although there are over 41 million moles spread across Britain, there are no moles in Ireland or Northern Ireland
